Publishes Carbon Negative Agriculture.com, Carbon Negative Forestry.com, the 2nd Agricultural Revolution.com & the 2nd Enlightenment.com. Director of the Center for Experimental and Theoretical Integrated Mycology, Denver (CETIM-Denver). He is a leading edge researcher in the introduction of mushrooms & associated organisms into our suburban habitat, working with 95 species of fungi in 2024. Specializing in the creation of customized mycelium (aka; mutualistic partners to human beings) for multiple applications, in particular, for the advancement of Carbon Negative Agriculture/ Forestry. Using mushrooms (the "brains" & administrators of the rhizosphere) in an Aggregated Organism System and biomimetics to sequester CO2 in the soil to create nutrient dense food rather than air pollution as nature intended.

He is developing techniques that allow mushrooms to pre-adapt to the habitat into which they will be introduced, allowing for non-sterile propagation techniques. That means that anyone can create a habitat for mushrooms at home, utilize the mushrooms in enhancing the fertility of your soil by sequestering nutrients and harvest mushrooms for eating/medicinal purposes. It's called "Natural Literacy", how an individual can understand, own and implement the solutions to climate change & a sustainable future.



Dr. Gelobter comes to Yale from the San Francisco Bay Area, where he presently serves as a Board member of CERES, New Energy Nexus, and as co-chair of the Green Leadership Trust. He is a senior advisor at Google X, an avid backpacker, and, most importantly, the (very proud) father of Marco, Nathan, and Troy.

She develops skill building programs and creates multimedia campaigns to dismantle privlege and increase opportunities for vulnerable populations to access healthy air, clean energy and a toxic free economy at the local, regional and national level. Tamara casts a wide net in service to the environmental community. She leads the Environmental Grantmakers Association (EGA) as its CEO and President. EGA represents over 200 foundations globally, holding approximately \$200 billion in assets and giving more than \$2 billion annually to environmental causes. She is the founder of Climate Critical, a visionary new organization supporting the development of the next generation of climate leaders. Tamara drives mission critical work and organizational investments to build a multiracial, multi-generational climate movement that is ready to hold leaders accountable to the long view of justice. Among her advisory roles, Tamara serves as an advisor to the Yale Center for Environmental Justice, is a foundation trustee and Director of several non profit Boards including of Friends of the Earth, Climate Refugees and Generation Green.

She is a senior advisor to the Green Leadership Trust. Previously, she served as the North America Director at 350.org and 350 Action as the leader of programming. Before 350, Tamara was the executive director of the Maryland Environmental Health Network (MdEHN), in Baltimore, Maryland. As its leader she promoted the elimination of environmental threats to human health through facilitation of coalitions led by community and supported by health practitioners and environmental advocates. Highlights at MdEHN include conception and development of an environmental justice digest of statewide policy through the lenses of equity, access, and justice. The digest was a resource for state legislators alongside a groundbreaking educational web series on human health and environmental impacts on issues ranging from community solar, to transportation and natural gas infrastructure. The series amplified the perspectives of community members in regional policy. As a state policy leader, Tamara cultivated groundswell support for legislation to include health impact assessments as standard at the Public Service Commission and co-founded the Healthy Green Maryland Amendment Initiative to define healthy communities and provide generational protections against disproportionate climate impacts within the Maryland constitution. Tamara was the chief architect of the Baltimore City Climate Resolution, which passed in the City Council unanimously in response to the US withdrawal from the Paris Climate Accords. Tamara's public service has included chairing the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments: Air and Climate Public Advisory Committee, where she advocated for meaningful engagement and responsive public resources. Additionally, she was chairwoman of the Board of Women's Voices for the Earth, which supports science-based advocacy to give voice to women fighting to protect their health from toxic chemicals. Tamara has over two decades of cross sector environmental experience. Prior to moving to the non-profit sector, she held several positions in state and local government including employment with the New York City Department of Environmental Protection, the Maryland Energy Administration and District Department of Energy and Environment in Washington, DC, among others. Tamara had the honor of serving as the Senior Law Clerk to the Honorable Douglas A. Brady, and his predecessor, Senior Sitting Judge Julio A. Brady (deceased) at the Superior Court of the US Virgin Islands on St. Croix. Tamara developed an early aptitude for environment and justice issues through internships with the Advisory Council of Historic Preservation, The Environmental Protection Agency, the Center on Race, Poverty and Environment, Natural Resources Defense Council. 
Tariana Navas Nieves Denver's Director of Cultural Affairs

Her name was Suse but when she was "sold" as a political prisoner to West Germany at age 14 it was changed to Susanne. She now uses Zuza to make it easier for English speakers to pronounce her name correctly. Zuza explains that "political prisoners" were traded for currency to stimulate the East German economy—she was traded for 50,000 Deutsche Marks. With the help of Amnesty International, the family was on the list to be traded and they were transferred to West Berlin. Zuza received her college degree from the Free University in Berlin, in Germanic languages, philosophy, and art history. She was awarded a Fulbright scholarship to study linguistics and anthropology at the University of Texas at Austin. Zuza received a master's degree in 1988 and moved to Boulder, Colorado in 1990. With her skill in several languages (she studied 16 different languages), she speaks daily German, English, and Spanish. Zuza has taught for more than 20 years in private and bilingual schools, while also volunteering in numerous Colorado nonprofits including Rocky Mountain Peace and Justice Center, Intercambio de Comunidades, Friendship City Projects and the Parent Engagement Network. Zuza is interested in community outreach and empowerment and enjoys working with youth. Zuza joined the UNA Boulder County board in 2011 and in June 2014 she was elected to be the regional representative for the United Nations Association of the Rocky Mountain region.
